His interests include gynecologic cancer survivorship, fertility preservation, tobacco associated cervical neoplasia, and the impact of gynecologic cancer on a patient's family and society.

She was the Study Chair and P.I. of GOG-259, a 3-arm RCT evaluating web-based symptom management interventions for women with recurrent ovarian cancer. She is currently the Principal Investigator and Co-Director of the first National Center on Family Support funded by the Administration for Community Living.

She is the co-founder and Director of the GynOnc Family CARE Center at Magee-Womens Hospital of the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, where her team provides support and education to family caregivers of patients with gynecologic cancer.

Susan Bitting has been a practicing healthcare provider since 1983. Having obtained her BSN in 2015 and MSN in Nursing and Healthcare Management in 2018 from Kent State University, she has since moved on in her coursework and is a Doctoral Candidate in Health Systems Leadership at Cleveland State University. Susan is a nursing leader in a large healthcare organization in Cleveland Ohio currently working in the perioperative field. Sharing this information is important because she was also diagnosed with Ovarian Cancer in the fall of 2015 and considers herself an Ovarian Cancer Survivor and Thriver. Susan believes there are ways in which cancer patients can thrive and overcome the stress and anxiety surrounding this and other cancer diagnosis. Approaches such as incorporating health and wellness, spiritual awareness and surrounding oneself with family and a strong healthcare team is most important. Finding ways in which cancer patients can help others through their own journey is a valuable tool that fosters healing and is one in which Susan has incorporated into her own life as an Ovarian Cancer Survivor. In her spare time Susan enjoys exercise, boating and spending time with family.



Diane RoseVice President of Volunteer Programs
at FORCE: Facing Our Risk of Cancer Empowered

Diane Rose is Vice President of Volunteer Programs at FORCE: Facing Our Risk of Cancer Empowered. She is a dedicated and highly motivated advocate working to improve the lives of the millions of men, women and families facing breast, ovarian, pancreatic, prostate, colorectal and endometrial cancers, and includes people with a BRCA, ATM, PALB2, CHEK2, PTEN or other inherited gene mutation and those diagnosed with Lynch Syndrome. As a BRCA mutation carrier, she has a personal investment in this cause. Her personal story started as a caregiver for multiple family member whom had cancer diagnosis that prepared for her work in advocacy.

Diane has been a leader in growing the organization's volunteer team to over 300 men and women and developing and implementing VolunteerFORCE Academy training. This includes coordination and training consumers for involvement in all aspects of research advocacy including preparing volunteers to participate as consumer reviewers for Peer Review. Diane has placed advocates in roles with the Department of Defense Congressionally-Directed Medical Research Program, IRB panels, research advisory panels, guideline panels, and clinical trial study teams and for participation in national and local conferences.

Diane also focuses on developing, nurturing and expanding relationships and collaborations with other organizations. In May 2019, FORCE received a PCORI Engagement Award for Project COGENT: Customizing Consumer GENerated Tools to Engage Researchers in collaboration with the University of South Florida. As a Co-Investigator for this project, Diane is working with researchers to learn about preferences for patient engagement in order to make FORCE's engagement tools more responsive to their needs. Additionally, as co-investigator for FORCE's 2019 CDC-funded Project EXTRA: Expanding XRAYS ThRough Alliances, Diane is working with over 30 partners to assist in improving patient digital health literacy and connect young breast cancer survivors, women living with metastatic breast cancer, caregivers, community health workers, and health care providers to relevant information, national guidelines, clinical trials and supportive services.

Diane serves on the NRG Cancer Prevention and Control Committee, the Patient Advocate Committee and the Breast Committee.

Dr. Tonorezos, serves as Director of the National Cancer Institute's Office of Cancer Survivorship. Dr. Tonorezos came to NCI from Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center and the Weill Cornell Medical College, both in New York, NY, where she served as Director of the Adult Long-Term Follow-Up Program for survivors of childhood and young adult cancers. Her research focuses on cardiometabolic consequences of cancer therapy, childhood and young adult cancer survivorship, diet and nutrition, and care coordination for this population. She serves on the National Academy of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine Committee on Childhood Cancer and Disability; the Cancer Survivorship Committee, the Adolescent and Young Adult Task Force, and the Clinical Guideline Committee for the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO); and the Metabolic Syndrome Guideline Committee for the Children's Oncology Group (COG). She is currently co-leader of the International Guideline Harmonization Group for the metabolic syndrome and led a recent international effort to develop recommendations for adult survivors of heritable retinoblastoma.

Dr. Tonorezos is a general internist, having earned her medical degree from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and masters in public health from the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She completed internal medicine residency and chief residency at Columbia University Medical Center, as well as a general internal medicine fellowship at the Johns Hopkins Hospital.

We have accumulated a large body of data regarding about the physical, psychosocial and economic challenges that face cancer survi-vors after completion of their cancer therapies. Moreover, we have demonstrated the profoundly negative impact that these unmet needs can have on their oncologic and non-oncologic outcomes of our patients. Yet there remains uncertainty regarding how best to implement a survivorship program that measurably improves patients' quality of life while reducing their health risks going forward.

Dr. Kristine Zanotti, Associate Professor of Gynecologic Oncology and Director of Seidman Cancer Center's Cancer Recovery and Survi-vorship Program will discuss key elements of survivorship program design and implementation, describe metrics for program success and identify methods for demonstrating program value for patients, to payors and within your institution. She will discuss her experience designing, implementing and scaling a survivorship program at her home institution and compare elements of program design that may be considered for different patient populations and health care systems.
